Christopher Goldston (b. 1972), Nationally Certified Teacher of Music, holds a master of music degree in piano performance and pedagogy from Northwestern University and a bachelor of music degree in piano performance from University of North Carolina-Greensboro. He has taught at Columbia College Chicago and Sherwood Conservatory of Music and currently maintains an independent studio in the historic Fine

Arts Building in Chicago, in addition to teaching virtually. In 1991, Christopher received the National Federation of Music Clubs Lynn Freeman Olson Composition Award for his first composition, "Night Train". Since then, he has written numerous pieces for piano, voice, and chamber ensemble, including his "Thesis for Wind Quintet," which won the 1993 Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) Composition Contest for North Carolina. He has compositions published by Alfred Music and the FJH Music Company. MTNA has commissioned Christopher for the Collaborative Music Commissioning Project for the 2022 MTNA National Conference.

Christopher has been the national coordinator for the MTNA Composition Competition since 2010. He has also served as state and division coordinator for the competition. Christopher has been very active in the Chicago Area Music Teachers Association and has served in numerous roles, including president, and vice-president in charge of programs. He was member of the year in 2008. He also served as president for the Illinois State Music Teachers Association from 2018 to 2020. Christopher was named an MTNA Foundation Fellow in 2020, and is currently serving as MTNA National Secretary-Treasurer for the 2021-2023 biennium.

Christopher is also in demand as a clinician and guest artist. He has presented for music groups across the United States and has presented sessions at numerous MTNA state conferences, as well as at the MTNA national conference in Kansas City, Missouri, in 2004. His students have won local, state, and national composition competitions, including the 2016–2017 Young Artist winner for the MTNA Composition Competition.

Dr. Julie Knerr Hague teaches piano at home studio in Windsor, Connecticut. Dr. Hague is a former faculty member at the Hartt School of Music Community Division, the University of Missouri, Oklahoma City University, and Ohio University, where she taught piano pedagogy, applied piano, and group piano to children and adults of all ages.

Julie holds a PhD in Music Education with an Emphasis in Piano Pedagogy from

the University of Oklahoma, where her dissertation on elementary level piano technique was nominated for the Best PhD Dissertation Award in 2006. Additional degrees include MM degrees in Piano Performance and Piano Pedagogy from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where Dr. Hague studied piano and harpsichord; and a BM in Piano Performance from the University of Puget Sound. Her mentors in Piano Pedagogy include Jane Magrath, Barbara Fast, Christos Tsitsaros, and Reid Alexander. She has been teaching private and group piano for 20 years.

Dr. Hague is coauthor with Katherine Fisher of the Piano Safari Method, and innovative piano method for beginners that combines learning by ear with learning to read music from the beginning of study. Launched in 2010, Piano Safari is now used by teachers and students throughout the United States and in 20 countries around the world. Together, Dr. Hague and Mrs. Fisher give presentations and lectures at national and regional conferences on various pedagogical topics.

Daniel Sharpio continues to gain recognition as a leading interpreter of Schubert, Beethoven, Mozart, Schumann, and Brahms, and as a teacher and coach at the Cleveland Institute of Music. He has given critically acclaimed performances across the United States, in Brazil, Britain, Ireland, Spain, France, Italy, Korea, and China, at the Amsterdam Concertgebouw, and at Walt Disney Concert Hall in Los Angeles. This season he performs his third complete cycle of the 32 Beethoven piano sonatas; previous live performances of all the sonatas can be found on this website. His DVDs of all of Schubert's major piano sonatas and his CD of Beethoven's "Diabelli" Variations have received enthusiastic reviews.

He has taught at CIM for the past twenty-three years, during which time has become known as an inspiring teacher who helps students achieve profound understanding and develop vivid interpretations of the masterworks. students have won important competitions and obtained teaching posts at prestigious universities and schools of music.

Shapiro has had the great

fortune of collaborating with some of the world's leading musicians, including Jaime Laredo, Shmuel Ashkenasi, Joseph Silverstein, Cho-Liang Lin, Roberto Diaz, Ronald Leonard, Franklin Cohen and Frank Rosenwein. He has performed regularly with members of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Chicago Symphony and the Cleveland Orchestra. He has also performed with the Cavani, Mirò, Linden and Rossetti Quartets, and has released chamber music CDs on the Harmonia Mundi and ASV labels. His Beethoven sonata collaborations with violinist Jaime Laredo can be found on youtube.com.


His musical scope also includes the study of conducting: he has worked with Daniel Lewis, Victor Yampolsky, Fritz Zweig, and Gustav Meier. He made his conducting debut at sixteen at Tanglewood, and conducted Mozart's Don Giovanni with the Akron Lyric Opera.

His musicianship has been enhanced and deepened by extensive collaboration with singers: listening to and working with them has been a source of tremendous inspiration. He studied art song with Gwendolyn Koldofsky and opera with Natalie Limonick, and was an opera and art song coach at UCLA.

A native of southern California, Shapiro began the study of piano at the age of six. His teachers included Leon Fleisher, John Perry, Russell Sherman, Joanna Graudan, and Reginald Stewart. He studied at the University of Southern California

and at the Peabody Conservatory, where he received his doctorate.

Shapiro is an expert Scrabble player-he is one of the top ranked players in Ohio, having won or placed in several tournaments. He lives with his family in Cleveland Heights.

maintains a private studio in Iowa City. She also serves as a staff accompanist at Cornell College. Nicole holds degrees from the University of Iowa and Western Illinois University. She is currently finishing her Doctor of Musical Arts degree in piano performance and pedagogy at the University of Iowa. She performs regularly in a wide variety of settings, and is particularly interested in twentieth-century French music. Her solo performances are featured in the independent film, Last Chance Tango.

Dr. Suzanne Torkelson is Professor of Piano at Wartburg College, as well as Director of the Tower School of Music, a program of pre-college students studying with Wartburg's student teachers. As past president of the Iowa Music Teachers Association (IMTA) and Repertoire Chairperson for the state of Iowa, she is actively involved in the professional field of piano pedagogy.

She is a frequent speaker in the areas of piano performance and pedagogy and has received Master Teacher Certification from both MTNA and IMTA. During her many years as Iowa's Repertoire Chair, she published five editions of the IMTA Syllabus Repertoire List, as well as reviews of new music in the Iowa Music Teachers Magazine. Dr. Torkelson spent the 2016-2017 academic year on sabbatical, finishing the last of the eight levels of Etudes with Technique© series for FJH Music, and working in London at the Royal Academy of Music. She has served MTNA at all levels, most recently as West Central Division Director and on the national board of directors.

Dr. Jason Sifford is a freelance pianist, teacher, and composer with a wide range of abilities and interests. He teaches at Cornell College (Iowa), maintains a private teaching studio in Iowa City, and is in demand as an adjudicator and clinician, lecturing on such diverse topics as classical performance practice, jazz pedagogy, technical development in young pianists, composition, and music Jason Sifford technology. He also appears regularly as



a music director and theater musician. As a composer, Dr. Sifford is primarily interested in didactic literature for the piano, and his catalog includes several solo collections, a baroque suite, and arrangements of popular and traditional songs. His music is featured in the state syllabi for Iowa and Minnesota, the bulletin for the National Federation of Music Clubs, and the Royal Conservatory of Music (Canada). Dr. Sifford holds degrees from Missouri State University, Louisiana State University, and the University of Michigan.



# HELP FOR SALE

n the last few years, a large number of consultants have appeared, promising to help creatives and teachers take their businesses to the next level. Some of these services are completely legitimate and run by teachers looking to share their expertise and experience. Others seem designed to convince teachers to part with their money in return for a polished, pre-packaged version of conventional wisdom.

I took a few of these consultants up on their offer of a free trial consultation and learned a great deal about this relatively new industry works. Here's what I learned:

#### There are No Guarantees

First, no consultant can promise that they'll be able to make you any money. What they can promise is that they'll be there for you. This could mean a phone call or Zoom meeting, or access to a special website or social media group where you can interact with them and their other clients. Sometimes they'll offer online classes with varying levels of support. These could be live or in-person and may or may not be interactive. Regardless, it's important to know what the consultant is actually promising. Their marketing may say "a proven system to generate six figures for your teaching business," but that could just mean they'll let you watch a video of them explaining how they helped one person accomplish that. (And this may or may not be relevant to your situation.)

#### **Costs Vary Widely**

Second, the costs of these services can run anywhere from \$100 to \$4000. Often, the more expensive services are aimed at music school owners who already generate considerable revenue. The less expensive options may be every bit as good (or better), but aimed at single-teacher studios instead. Here, you have to weigh the potential benefits. Consider this – if a \$200 consulting fee helps you land two new students that you wouldn't have otherwise found, then you could easily recoup that fee

in one month – totally worth it! If a \$1000 consulting fee helps land you ten students, then that too could pay for itself within a month. The question is, do you have the money up front and are you willing to take the risk?

#### You Still Have to Do the Work

And third, you still have to do the work. This is something we're already familiar with. We can give our students great advice, hold them accountable in weekly lessons, and offer opportunities for them to grow and learn, but they still have to sit down at the piano and do the work! Those who benefit most from consulting services are often those who are already have the time, energy, and motivation to do the work but who need someone to go to for advice and accountability.

#### How Do I Find a Good Consultant?

If you've been intrigued by the idea of hiring a consultant or taking an online class to grow your studio, I'd highly recommend exploring established and popular websites, blogs, podcasts, and Youtube channels. These creators have often already established themselves as experts in the field, and you can often check out their free offerings to see if they might be the right fit for you.



# 1990 STATE CONVENTION **HIGHLIGHTS**

It all started on the drive back from Storm Lake to Iowa City after the 1989 Convention. Catherine Burke, Ruth Lutz and I had been informed by our President, Dee Matthiessen, that we would be on the steering committee for the 1990 Convention--it seemed a perfect time to bounce ideas around. Sharon Kay Stang and Mary Beth Barteau were added to the committee and with the guidance of our Chairperson, Carole Thomas, and President

Dee, it all came together. All seemed to be going smoothly until we were informed that the School of Music would be closed for repairs for the entire summer! Alas, what to do! President Dee contacted other possible colleges in this part of the state to see if one of them could host the convention. It was too late-their calendars had been set for those dates. But clinicians had been contacted for the program and I had made arrangements for housing and meals so we had to move ahead. I contacted the University Memorial Union and found a room that would seat 120--the Terrace Room seemed to meet our needs if we were willing to give up having a stage. What we thought would be a

Dr. Marvin Thostensen led off the Convention at 9:30 a.m. with several suggestions on teaching theory to our students. We were off to a flying start! Tony Caramia, clinician for the

University of Illinois at Champagne-Urbana, gave a fascinating session on Jazz Piano Styles. His specific hints for teaching the jazz style such as tempo, accents, articulation, grace notes and many other helpful ideas were enlightening. The afternoon session was devoted to teaching beginning improvisation. Mr. Caramia used a 4th grade student in the audience to demonstrate how you begin this process. He really inspired the student. She went home and found she could produce amazing sounds! The session ended with a thirtyminute recital of jazz and ragtime that received a wonderful response.

Dr. Joel Brown had the next session on Teaching the Bach Inventions. Don't start them too early and expect an average student to work on one for four or five months to achieve a good performance was one of his points.

Scholarship Auditions had a large group of entries this year. The first place winner was Matthew Brady, piano (student of Mary Beth Barteau). Second place winner was Kate Kloss, voice (student of Karla Goettel).

Carole Thomas delighted us all with a presentation of New Music for the Intermediate Pianist.

The Keynote Address was given by Dr. Richard Slaven, Supt. of Schools in Ohio. He gave us a very thought-provoking session that made us realize what an opportunity we have to touch our students' lives. We can give them a vision of what they can be and, most important, praise

them when they are successful.

Dr. Kenneth Amada gave us his ideas on how to teach our students to practice. The statement "There is no such thing as full speed practice" will be shared with all of our students!

The honors recital was wonderful with 24 students performing. This truly made us aware of what IMTA is all about.

The Independent Music Teachers Forum Breakfast was tasty and the discussions were informative. Each table was given a topic to discuss and report on. (See Mary Miller's article elsewhere in this issue.)

A continuation from last year's program on Judging a Student Performance was helpful to all teachers in preparing students for auditions as well as giving ideas to those teachers who will be doing the judging. The judges were Sue Hudson, Patricia Medley and Suzanne Torkelson.

We had two wonderful recitals. The Thursday evening recital was presented by several members of the University of Iowa School of Music. They performed on viola, violin, cello, clarinet and piano. Included was the premier performance of "Six Afterludes for Piano for Four Hands" by Eric Zioleck. It was performed by Carole Thomas and Mary Beth Barteau. This was our commissioned work for the year and will become an entry for the National Composer of the Year Award for 1991--we all enjoyed the composition and wish it further success. The Friday evening recital was given by Uriel Tsachor, a visiting professor at the University of Iowa. It was a beautiful performance by an artist who has performed as a soloist as well as with major symphonies in Europe and the United States.





# IN THE SPOTLIGHT

with Dr. Julie Knerr Hague

Learning along the way

**Dr. Julie Knerr Hague** is the coauthor, with Katherine Fisher, of the **Piano Safari Method**. She teaches piano at her home studio in Connecticut. Julie taught applied piano, piano pedagogy, and group piano as a faculty member at the University of Missouri, Oklahoma City University, Ohio University, and the Hartt School Community Division.

Julie holds a PhD in Music Education with an emphasis in Piano Pedagogy from the University of Oklahoma, where her dissertation on elementary level piano technique was nominated for the Best PhD Dissertation Award in 2006. Additional degrees include MM degrees in Piano Performance and Piano Pedagogy from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and a BM in Piano Performance from the University of Puget Sound. Her mentors in piano pedagogy include Jane Magrath, Barbara Fast, Christos Tsitsaros, and Reid Alexander.

As an accomplished collaborative pianist, Julie enjoys performing with both instrumentalists and singers. Her former piano teachers include Duane Hulbert, James Barbagallo, William Heiles, Timothy Ehlen, and Edward Gates.

Julie is a frequent lecturer and adjudicator at festivals throughout the United States. Her current research interests include elementary level piano technique, lesser known pre-college piano repertoire, and group piano pedagogy.

eaching has been a part of my life for as long as I can remember in one form or another. When I was very young, I would "teach" the bears that lived in my doll house, arranging them in classes and calling on them to answer questions and sing songs. That was the start of my teaching career! Since those first steps, I have been blessed by many varied teaching influences that have guided me to the career I find myself in today as a teacher, author, researcher, publisher, composer, and church musician.

If one thinks of a "standard" path that might take a person from child to musician, one might imagine a series of excellent piano teachers, followed by college and graduate school classes, perhaps enhanced by teaching internships. And yet, as I look back on my own formative years, the influences that had the deepest impact on my musical life were much more subtle. I think of myself primarily as a teacher, author of curriculum, and researcher of pre-college piano literature, and over the years, pivotal influences have shaped me in my journey toward these focuses of my music career.

My mother was one of my first teaching influences. During my middle school years, I was granted leave during study hall to help my mother in her Kindergarten class. Helping her organize teaching materials and observing how she taught the children in her class was the highlight of my school day. Mom also shaped my first experiences with writing curriculum. She not only taught Kindergarten, but she also art to the upper grades. I remember fondly the hours I spent with her during the summers as she developed a high school art history curriculum. I assisted her with easy tasks, but looked back, I realize now that I absorbed so much that relates to my own work now as a method coauthor. Mom also provided my first taste of private teaching. The summer after ninth grade, she allowed me to tutor a few of her Kindergarten

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students in reading. She suggested fun activities I could teach to the children, and I found that I absolutely loved helping children learn in creative ways.

Piano lessons were another highlight of my childhood. We had an antique upright piano in our house. It had chipped ivory keys that stuck in the summer, and a mouse lived under the piano! I started lessons at the age of six through a traditional Middle C method. I was a natural reader and became immediately adept at reading music notation. Sight reading has always been a joy. In fact, I still spend much of my time today reading through music for my research into lost composers from the past.

My parents took a hands-off approach to practicing, and I wish I had been more diligent in my practicing. However, I did make good use of the times I should have been practicing by climbing up to stand on the piano bench and change the records on the record player we kept on top of the piano. I was entranced by these recordings of Chopin, Beethoven, and Rachmaninoff Piano Concertos, Beethoven Symphonies, and other great works. Looking back, I realize now how formative these listening experiences were in my musical development.

As I graduated high school and headed to college, I knew I wanted to major in music, but exactly what my career path should be seemed murky. This was when another mentor reentered my life. From the ages of eight to ten, I had studied with an excellent teacher before our move from Connecticut to California, and I kept up a correspondence with her over the years. One day while I was in college, she sent me a brochure about piano pedagogy with a note that said she had thought of me when she saw it. I did not even know there was a branch of study called "piano pedagogy," but I was intrigued by her suggestion.

I majored in Piano Performance at the University of Puget Sound in Tacoma, Washington. My college years were wonderful. I grew so much as a pianist and musician through excellent classes and professors, gained much experience as an accompanist, and developed lifelong friendships with fellow musicians. After I graduated, I was not sure what to do next. At that time, I was focused primarily on accompanying, but I did not yet have the confidence to successfully start auditioning for graduate school programs.

I decided to stay in Tacoma and teach piano, accompany for ballet classes, and play for singers and instrumentalists at the university. Teaching my very first piano lesson as a newly graduated musician was anything but auspicious. I was scheduled to travel to the little girl's home to teach her lesson, but I realized just before it was time to leave that I had lost the piece of paper with the name, address, and phone number of my new student! In those days before cell phones and the internet, I flipped through the white pages in the phone book hoping to find their last name, which I was sure started with a "B," to no avail. I had to wait until they called me to find out why I had not shown up as scheduled. I apologized profusely and rescheduled for the next week. Thankfully, this rocky start was not a sign of things to come, and I discovered that I loved teaching children and had a knack for it. I had found my niche. I started staying up late making teaching aids and worksheets to help my students progress in their piano journeys and was always looking for ways to improve my teaching.

A few years later, another mentor entered my life, unbeknownst to her at the time. I decided to join MTNA and attended my very first state conference. At the conference, Dr. Jane Magrath lectured on intermediate piano literature. At one point, she said, "For time's sake, we are going to skip over some of these pieces, since I am sure you already know them." I thought, "Wait! I don't know those pieces. I should know those pieces! I need to go to grad school and learn more!"

I was accepted into the graduate program at University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana, and it was in the basement of the music library that another formative influence appeared. In the days before streaming services, we checked out CDs from the music library. On the desk at the checkout counter was a computer that had a database where we could search for CDs based on various criteria. I do not know why this database struck me as more interesting than a standard library catalog, but I was fascinated. I decided during my time in Illinois that I could do something similar, and my ambition became to create a database of all precollege piano literature. This hobby has been a joy that has lasted with me to this day, and in the next few years, I hope to launch this searchable database of literature for public use by other teachers and students.

After two Masters degrees from the University of Illinois in piano performance and piano pedagogy, I headed to Oklahoma to work on my PhD in Music Education with an Emphasis in Piano Pedagogy. Dr. Magrath, who had unknowing launched my graduate school years through her lecture at the state conference, became one of my pedagogy professors, and I became her administrative assistant. This gave me valuable practice in administrative tasks and provided me with access to her extensive library of pre-college piano repertoire as another way to add to my repertoire database. Besides the wonderful classes and professors, I met numerous colleagues who helped me develop as a teacher and musician through our informal discussions in the Pedagogy Library. That little room was the focus of so much creative energy as we all congregated there between classes to discuss our teaching ideas and browse through materials.

One unusual but profound influence on my thoughts about teaching came from the School of Ballet at the University of Oklahoma. I had accompanied ballet classes to pay the bills since college days, but somewhere along the way I decided to start taking ballet classes myself as an adult beginner. Some teachers might have had the attitude that our classes were not very important, since we adult beginners had inflexible bodies and would likely never progress very far. However, I had one teacher who was a true pedagogue. She realized that we, even as adult beginners, wanted to be taught correctly, were eager to learn, and took ballet seriously both as an art form and as exercise. Her classes were intense, kind, and wonderful. I realized that regardless of innate ability, all students deserve good teachers who help them reach their goals and potential. I also recognized that the beginning stages of learning a skill are foundational. A teacher who understands how to best teach the fundamentals is crucial

at the early stages of training. I discovered that I actually prefer teaching piano to beginners, as I find it endlessly fascinating to see how each individual students learns and to help students gain the skills that provide a solid foundation for their future work at the piano. These ideas also played a part in the careful planning that went into the creation of Piano Safari.

Perhaps the most influential person I met during my time at the University of Oklahoma was Katherine Fisher. Little did I know when we met in that first week in pedagogy class that we would become friends, business partners, and the creators of an internationally known piano method, Piano Safari. But when Katherine mentioned that she had always thought of writing a piano method, I realized I had also had this thought! We started sketching our initial ideas on scraps of paper over coffee at the campus cafe.

When the time came to choose my dissertation topic, I wanted it to write something that would be of practical use to teachers. I decided to study beginning-level technique because I did not feel I had adequate technical training growing up, which manifested in a lack of confidence in my playing. I also had many questions about how to better teach technique to my own students. During my dissertation and post-dissertation research, I interviewed and observed twelve well-known teachers of pre-college piano students from around the country about how they taught technique. I learned much about technique, but more about teaching! Observing these teachers changed everything about my teaching. Although the teachers came from various technical schools of thought and used a variety of methods and materials, they all had wonderful ideas that helped me grow and change immensely in my own teaching. Out of my dissertation research came the Seven Animal Techniques found Piano Safari Level 1. I also began to incorporate more play and props (like stuffed animals) in my lessons with younger children, which greatly enhanced the joy in the lessons. And I became acquainted with the use of rote teaching in lessons.

Katherine and I had both taught a variety of the methods available on the market, and we knew we wanted to use an intervallic reading approach in Piano Safari, since we had both had much success with this reading approach as found in Frances Clark's Music Tree method. In order to add more exciting pieces to our step-by-step intervallic approach to the reading in Piano Safari, we decided to add some Rote Pieces for students to learn alongside their Reading Pieces. These Rote Pieces were specifically composed around keyboard patterns beginners could easily understand, such as groups of two and three black keys, the music alphabet, whole tone, and chromatic patterns. Just as young children can understand stories that are too difficult for them to read on their own, students can also play and understand music that is more difficult than they can read. These Rote Pieces are longer and more complicated than their short and simple Reading Pieces. Our goal was to include Rote Pieces that would be motivating and exciting for students to learn while they also work on basic reading skills in their Reading Pieces.

As we implemented this unique Rote plus Reading approach, we discovered that motivation is only one of the many benefits

of rote learning in piano lessons. Compared to our previous experience with only teaching reading, we found that the study of Rote Pieces helped students develop better rhythmic skills, technical fluency, confidence, and musical understanding. They also used the patterns from their Rote Pieces to create their own improvisations and pieces. The combination of teaching Rote and Reading from the beginning was a huge lightbulb moment in our teaching careers, and with the development of Piano Safari, many teachers and students have benefited from this blend of two historically separate approaches.

Between a dissertation (me), marriage and babies (Katherine), several university positions (me), and several moves (both of us), it took us ten years to develop Piano Safari Level 1 from its inception during graduate school to its current form. We initially wrote Piano Safari for use with our own students, but we found that other teachers were also interested in it. Neither of us had any preparation for starting a small business, and we have learned along the way the ins and outs of entrepreneurship. We are both incredibly blessed to have met each other and become such close friends as well as business partners. We both enjoy writing new materials, interacting with teachers around the world, and teaching our own students.

Piano Safari has grown from Level 1 to three levels, and we have expanded the original core method with the addition of Piano Safari for the Older Student for older beginners and Piano Safari Friends for preschool students. We have begun work on the Advancing Pianist series for technique and sight reading beyond Level 3. Two large projects around the corner include the launch of our online pedagogy institute in August of this year and, in the future, a graded anthology series based music I have discovered from my repertoire database research.

As I look back on my music career, I see that seemingly small experiences, from assisting in my mom's Kindergarten class, to finding a database in the basement of a library, to a brochure in the mail from a former teacher, all had an incredible influence on my music career. It reminds me to be mindful in every interaction with my young students, as I may not know how a small interaction might have a profound influence on my students' future paths.

# STUDENTS PROGRESS DURING FESTIVAL SEASON

I blinked and Festivals are over. In fact, winter is almost over, and thank goodness! While I am tired of the illness and weather requiring me to reschedule numerous lessons in January and February, I can see how much progress each student has made this school year. If I tracked student progress since August on a chart I would see two spikes indicating a leap in growth for each student. The first progress spike came right after our IMTA Festival in December and the second spike came right before recital in January. I am sure many of you could say the same for your students' progress.

This year 247 students from across the state participated in IMTA Festivals. In 11 centers, 49 teachers participated and the centers ranged in size from only 1 teacher to as many as 12 teachers participating in the same event.

A few of the probationary judges adjudicated for several festivals, and two more teachers have completed the probationary judge's requirements. Those teachers are Dr. Xiao Hu

of Decorah and Dr. Vakhtang Kodanashvili from Cedar Falls. Congratulations! All of the new judges' names will appear on the IMTA Judges List for the 2023-2024 year.

If you are interested in being added to the list of judges, please complete the Probationary Judging Application and send it to me. Probationary Judges need to judge for three festival events and receive positive feedback from the festival chairs. Upon doing this they will be added to the IMTA Judges List the following July and will be able to adjudicate for Auditions.

To find the Probationary Judging Application, login to the iamta.org website. Then click on the gold "Adjudicators" tab. You will find the application as well as the Evaluation Form to be completed by a Festival chair after a festival event.

Chinese, Japanese, and Malaysian cultures were recorded and published online.


