NEW REPERTOIRE UPDATES FOR 2023-2024

hank you to those of you who suggested new music for our presentation at the 2023 Coe College IMTA conference. The presentation was a little different this year; there was no handout but there were examples shown on an overhead. We were pleasantly surprised there were so many possibilities we could add to this year's repertoire list.

You may notice the new feature online to help draw attention to under-represented composers marked in italics. You will be able to find these compositions to quickly share with your students as you desire. We realize the under-represented composers list is somewhat subjective. Should you discover additional composers already on the list that should be italicized, please alert us so it might appear on the 2025 listing. Thank you to Dr. Perry Mears for his helpful suggestions in this area.

Please be aware that the update is available on the website beginning July 15. In the past, we have found inconsistencies between hard copies and handouts from conference, causing much confusion. As a committee, we wish to make it easier for you to find accurate information. That said, old or new hard copies will no longer be distributed or allowed for cross-checking purposes. We hope you take advantage of the online list as it is now the only accurate and final list. New entries are marked 2023. Remember, you may start entering your student's repertoire as soon as you wish and alter any time up to the registration deadline date. Early entering of information online will help to avoid many of the errors that have been made in the past.

Should you find an obvious, egregious error, please alert us and it will be corrected in the update the following year. With this July 15, 2023 update, all of your personal information concerning student repertoire will also be erased, so please take the time to print a copy of your student performances from your personal dashboard page if you wish to track pieces you use regularly.

Again, we welcome your new music suggestions at all levels. This assists us in finding new gems that we as a committee may have not known about, or overlooked. Have a great "new music" summer!

FESTIVAL CALENDAR

he State Conference was a great time to catch up with many teachers, as always!

Below is the most complete list I have for the 2023-2024 Festival Calendar. The webmaster, Angela Binns, has also posted this on the website. I will update information there as the last few dates and chairs are determined, as well as adding deadlines.

This year we had 11 centers, 247 students, and 49 teachers involved in IMTA Festivals. All these numbers are up from the last couple of years, which is encouraging to see.

Festival rates will not change for 2023-2024, and will remain as follows: \$20/20-minutes, \$30/30 minutes, \$45/45 minutes and \$60/60 minutes. The judging and mileage rates also will remain the same at \$35/hour and \$0.50/mile, respectively.

Two minor rule updates were made. The first is about teachers using their own login during registration. The reason being that the website automatically enters the teacher's name who is logged in, regardless of the teacher's name and MTNA number entered. Two minor issues came up this year, and I hope to avoid confusion in the future. If you are interested in finding the Festival Rules, they can be found at iamta.org/festivals.php.

The second rule is in regards to ISMLP; using music that is public domain: Students will be allowed to use public domain scores for IMTA events but must provide evidence that their use represents fair use as required by copyright law. Any use of music not printed by the publisher must include the required documentation such as printed receipt, permission page (for digital copies authorized for use) or the link page verifying that the music is in US public domain (for IMSLP or other free public domain scores). Verification information should be paper clipped to the printing so that it can be removed by the judge's assistant once verification has been completed.

Lastly, we added three new names to the IMTA Adjudicator's List this year: Allison Chenoweth, Xiao Hu and Vahktang Kodanashvili. Seven more teachers are in varying stages of completing their probationary judging requirements. Please consider them as you schedule your festivals for 2023-2024. The most updated list is always available on the website, iamta.org/members/forms-resources.php, under 2023-2024 Probationary Judges List.


We hope to see even more of you next year when our conference travels to Drake University in Des Moines.

Dr. Marion Lee, NCTM named the 2023 IMTA Certified Teacher of the Year

arian Lee made her New York City debut at Carnegie Hall's Weill Recital Hall as winner of the Artists International Award and has appeared as soloist and with orchestra internationally in Austria. Belgium, Italy, France, Norway, Russia, Azerbaijan, Turkmenistan, Poland, Brazil, Byelorussia, Estonia, Hong Kong, and Thailand, as well as in Lincoln Center, the Kennedy Center's Millenium Benaroya Stage, Hall and Rachmaninoff Hall,

and the Hermitage Winter Palace in St. Petersburg, Russia. In liaison with the U.S. State Department, Lee also received numerous grants in support of performances of American contemporary music abroad and is a former Fulbright and International Research and Exchange (IREX) scholar.

Marian Lee has given numerous world and U.S. premieres by contemporary composers from Russia, France, the Baltic republics and the United States. Notable professional activities include violin and piano duos with Philadelphia Orchestra concertmaster David Kim, Milwaukee Symphony concertmaster Frank Almond, and Naha Greenholz, concertmaster of Madison and Quad City Symphony Orchestras. She has also held master classes in Hong Kong, Delaware, Louisiana, Alabama, Illinois and Iowa.

Marian Lee made her initial concert debut in high school performing with Ann Arbor Symphony Orchestra and Flint Symphony Orchestra in Michigan. She entered The Juilliard School as a scholarship student receiving a Bachelor of Music under the guidance of Gyorgy Sandor. She went on to receive a Master of Music degree in piano performance with Seymour Lipkin and was

subsequently awarded the coveted Fulbright Grant to study with Naum Shtarkman at the Moscow Conservatory in what was then the Soviet Union. During her three-year stay, Dr. Lee witnessed the fall of the Soviet Union and toured extensively within the former USSR. Upon her return to the United States, Dr. Lee completed her doctoral degree at the Peabody Conservatory of Music at The Johns Hopkins University with Boris Slutsky.

Dr. Lee previously taught at the University of Iowa and the University of Delaware before moving to Davenport, Iowa where she is currently an associate professor in piano and serves as head of the keyboard area at St. Ambrose University. 

ello Everyone! First, I would like to thank everyone who has entrusted me these past two years with the role of State Auditions Chair. It has truly been an honor serving you all in this capacity, and I appreciate each and every person

As I transition this role over to the very capable and brilliant Dr. Andrea Johnson on July 1, I wanted to provide updates and decisions made during the State Conference:

The 2024 auditions date has been scheduled for March 9, 2024 at Iowa State University.

For those attending State Auditions next year, please note that prior to attending, Iowa State's risk management department will be requesting your name and address to complete a background check. More information will be forthcoming on this as the State Auditions date approaches.

Reminder that if you plan or want to adjudicate this coming 2023-2024 season, you MUST renew your membership by July 1, 2023.

Time limits for Levels D, E, and F will remain at 15, 18, and 25 minutes, respectively.

The Executive Board voted (Under the Keyboard Proficiency Section of our Rules and Regulations) to include this paragraph to help avoid any further confusion: "Adjudicators are required to verbally instruct students on keyboard proficiency requirements before each student plays." Adjudicators will be provided the proper language to request the keyboard proficiency with requirements Instructions to Judges pages


The Executive Board voted (Under the Eligibility Section of our Rules and Regulations) to include this paragraph: "Teachers must register students under their own log-in on the IMTA website."

Auditions entrance fees will increase from \$25 to \$30 per entrant, to help offset tuning and building reservation costs.


WORK TO PREMIER IN 2024

I imagined this experience must equate to watching Peter teach. He carefully examined each item as if it were a musical score, judiciously dissecting everything for a most effective outcome.



IN THE SPOTLIGHT

with Peter Mack

Tell tales that bring music to life!

Steinway Artist and Irish artist Peter Mack is celebrated for his moving playing and easy rapport with audiences. He has performed throughout the United States and Europe, as well as in Australia, India, and the former Soviet Union. Well known for his extensive repertoire, Mack has performed twenty-six different concertos with orchestras. Past engagements include performances at the Salle Cortot in Paris and Haydnsaal of the Esterhazy Palace in Austria. He is in great demand as a clinician and teacher and has delivered advanced master classes at the Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) annual convention and the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy (NCKP). His students are frequent winners of local, national, and international competitions, including twentyone MTNA national finalists and three MTNA national first place winners. Mack earned his doctorate in piano performance at the University of Washington. His principal teachers were Frank Heneghan and Bela Siki. He is the winner of the New Orleans, Young Keyboard Artists, and Pacific International piano competitions. He is a choral scholar at Trinity College Dublin and a fellow of Trinity College London.

few months ago, I was asked how I felt about incorporating music history in lessons. My immediate reaction was "I really should do more of that..."

However, if instead of using the words "teaching history" we use the words "tell gossipy stories about the composers", then I teach history at almost every lesson. Often, simply understanding the circumstances surrounding the composition provides the key to interpreting the piece.

I recently had a student learning Debussy's "Doctor Gradus ad Parnassum" from "Children's Corner." This piece paints a picture of Debussy's daughter, practicing her uninspired Clementi technical exercises at the piano. (Chouchou, his daughter, was never the most dedicated student.) Half-way through the piece, she starts to daydream. The music gets slower and slower, eventually almost coming to a stop. But then she remembers that she still must finish her exercises. We hear her practicing faster and faster until she has the correct number done With the last chord of the piece, she triumphantly slams down the lid of the piano, and runs outside to play, free at last.

Debussy complained to his daughter's piano teacher: "For two years now Chouchou has made no noticeable progress... she should be in the hands of someone stricter... Your future does not lie wholly within the confines of the teaching profession, at least for your sake I hope not."

Try to imagine the frustration of the father, the daughter, and the teacher, all trapped in an unproductive musical nightmare. We have all been there in some capacity. Even if telling interesting gossipy stories might not be what pedants think of as teaching music history, it certainly makes the piece more accessible to everyone. Teaching bare facts (e.g. "Debussy was born in 1862 and died in 1918") does nothing but bore the student. Tell tales instead, and bring the music to life!

This year's recipient, although sharing many great qualities as past year's award winners, has a distinguishing and unique difference. In an effort to maintain a presence of fairness and equality the 2001 Certified Teacher of the Year exhibits one quality that NO other recipient has possessed. He is male and in our profession that makes him a minority!

In his nomination as lowa's Teacher of the Year, he is respectfully referred to as Dr. William David. But I, for one, am appreciative that he signs his e-mails as "Bill." He has had many students excel at state and national competitions, but his greatest influence has to be in the example he sets. Bill has set a standard of professionalism to both his students and colleagues by receiving his MTNA Professional Certificate as a college faculty member. Surely, this was not a pre-requisite to his being hired. I'm confident it was not a part of his doctoral training and course work. I'm positive it didn't help him to gain more students, nor make him more successful with his students. I can almost guarantee you, it did not garner for him a raise in salary.

50 YEARS OF LEARNING



t's difficult as the IMTA editor to write about myself. I recommend that bios are always written in third person, however; I am going to do this differently, so please bear with me.

This year I celebrated the unique experience of 50 years of teaching. It was thrilling to be honored by

MTNA at their awards breakfast in Reno, Nevada, during the National Conference. It seemed a fitting passageway to becoming director of West Central Division in 2024.

In May, with the help of many, I coordinated a 50-year celebration recital with my students. Because my studio is large (or out of control?), we determined an awards brunch would be fitting. There was ample fellowship, fun and, of course, great food. The afternoon recital was long yet engaging. The performances were followed by a large reception and, again, great food, music by alumni and camaraderie.

Growing up in a studio, our sons Joel and Jennon may have never wanted to sit through another recital, yet they graciously attended. They later divulged that they were texting back and forth- saying, "Wow, that was amazing", "how did they memorize that?" or, "I can't believe such a young kid plays that well." For me, their reactions to the student performances were genuinely heart-warming. I was equally thrilled to visit with friends, family, fellow teachers, former parents, and alumni who flew home and traveled long distances, not to mention quite a few surprise guests. I reconnected, or I should say, found a new friend in my very first student, Anne (Stalker) Tyler. She and her husband surprised me by driving from Minneapolis to Ankeny for the weekend. After 40+ years of losing touch, I was astounded when she shared I had

changed her path from a shy young lady to her now "you've got this" personality. Little did I know how I had influenced that very first student. I have spent years wondering how in the world she survived lessons as my guinea pig! She shared with her own family that I was the teacher who had the biggest impact on her life, and she instilled those positive qualities in her children.

Anne is a business professional and a part-time writer. She personally created and framed a touching poem that hangs in my studio to be treasured forever. She asked that I read it from time to time, and hoped from her words, my students would also gain understanding of what music will mean to them in the future as they become adults. Inevitably, tears came from the power of her words.

The intensity of this last year has been nothing short of challenging. My students and their parents are the wonderful people who keep me energized. I am fortunate that so many of them are serious about their music studies. I believe that all of them hold a deep love for music.

The path to 50 has never been an easy one, nor should it be. Like you, I have experienced moments of inadequacy, hopelessness, and loss. Many of us wonder if we are following the correct path. We fret over students, policies, parents, competitions, recitals and worry about not getting enough personal time with friends and family.

One constant that has fueled my studio is the relationships with my colleagues. I'm convinced I could not have endured without IMTA and MTNA. I was fortunate that my high school teacher, Connie Danielson, pushed me, as she rarely left any stone unturned. She insisted I join IMTA when I acquired my first student. I soon had many students. Later, I was fortunate to study with Dr. William David, who continues to inspire me and offer steady, kind advice. I can't thank him enough for hanging in there with me. There were many times I was not a stellar student!

With encouragement from them both, I was nationally certified in my early 20s. The MTNA requirements were a minimum of 30 years of age to apply for national certification. Connie Danielson served on the national certification board and in true Connie fashion, eliminated the age limitation. To date, I consider my college years and certification my 'superpower'.

To close, I could go on about accomplishments, the offices I've served, and the experiences I've had; but I prefer to offer advice to my colleagues—you are in the right place. There will always be someone in this organization pushing you ahead or lending a hand. Mistakes will be followed by growth; fears will bring comfort; moments of shortcomings will turn into discovery. I have learned to appreciate the days I still feel like a beginning teacher.

I cannot thank all of you enough for your presence in my journey. Some of you have been here from the very beginning (Lois Nassen, Zoe Abrahamson, Bill David). I can say without a doubt, I have learned from everyone as I value the countless lifelong friendships I have made through our local, state and national organizations.

One of my cherished students who presented a senior recital many years ago (despite his monumental learning challenges), concluded his recital with the gift of a dozen roses. I know he meant to say, "thank you, Cyndie; I've learned so much from you". Instead, his words came out perfectly mixed up: "thank you, Cyndie, she has learned so much from me". There wasn't a dry eye in the house; his error was the justifiable truth. I learned from you, Brett, and every student, regardless of accomplishments or struggles. I couldn't be more grateful to my husband, family, teachers, students, and everyone who has had a profound impact on a gratifying career. I'm not finished by any means- I have more to learn, more to teach, more friendships to gain, and more experiences waiting to fill an already blessed life. I can only humbly say 'thank you' to everyone.

I quickly realized I needed to extend my spring cleaning to my digital workspace as well, so I thought I'd share a few of the strategies I'm using as I embark on my digital spring cleaning.

Tip #1 – Use Cloud Storage

There are several cloud storage options. Google Drive, Dropbox, and OneDrive are the most popular, and they all work in similar ways. The handy thing about them is that you can choose to have files available only in the cloud (freeing up space on your computer), or you can set files to be available offline so you can access them without an internet connection.

I always recommend focusing on one cloud service – it can get confusing if you can't remember whether you put a file in Dropbox or on Google Drive. But if you find yourself sharing files with students or colleagues, it's worth it to at least have free accounts on Dropbox and Google Drive, since it makes it easier to share files with others who use those services.



Most of us are used to having files stored in folders. When the home computer was first invented, operating systems were designed with filing systems that resembled the file cabinets most people were already familiar with. The icons still look like manila folders! But what if you're wanting some sheet music at level three but all your files are organized by composer? The key here is to include the name of the composer and the level in the file name. I might have "Hook Minuet IMTA B2", and even though I store all my digital music files by composer name, it will also show up if a search for "minuet" or "IMTA B2." I do the same with email – rather than spend a ton of time sorting email into different folders, I use search. When I send emails to parents about our spring recital, I make sure I put "2023 Spring Recital" in the subject. If I want to see who's responded to that email, I simply search for "2023 Spring Recital" and it will show me all the responses to that email.

Tip #3 – Save Often and Keep Backups


Backup your files. I cannot stress this enough. I keep copies of everything in three places on my home desktop, on my cloud service, and on an external hard drive that I back up every few months. Glitches happen. I had an application crash unexpectedly and would've lost three hours of work except that I've made a habit of pressing control-S every five minutes or so. (And thankfully, many applications do automatic saves.) Almost everyone I know has lost valuable time because of computer crashes and lost files. Do yourself a favor, save often and back up your files. I was once asked about a workshop I'd given twenty years ago – a teacher had kept and used a handout of mine for that long. They'd lost their copy and emailed me for it. After twenty years, that file was still sitting on an external backup in my closet. The great thing about digital storage is that it doesn't take up much physical space. A lifetime of work can fit in a shoebox, just make sure that shoebox is well-organized!

LMTA-MOP is a unique program which provides low-cost music lessons with an LMTA Teacher who meets educational and active requirements, instruments and their upkeep, instructional materials, and community performance opportunities for up to 50 area limited-resource students to study the instrument of their choice.

The cost to student families is determined by the Federal Reduced/ Free Lunch status. When ready, students may participate in community service recitals and enter (free of charge) all LMTA events, District and State Festivals, and MTNA Competitions. Exceptional students, or "Rising Stars", may audition to study a second instrument or spend more time with their present teacher without paying an extra contribution.

Using private, area foundation and club donations, grants, fundraising activities, and modest fees paid by the student families, LMTA-MOP pays its teachers and other operating costs. Because of the work of LMTA volunteers who administer the program, and Community Partners who provide free or greatly reduced-cost piano tuning, instrument rental, upkeep and repairs, free printed music, piano moving and storage, and meeting or teaching space, LMTA-MOP remains strong.

MUSIC SPEAKS: GEMS FROM A PRINT MUSIC GEEK

ello from Nessa Maly with Rieman Music. I am super delighted to share joys about my favorite repertoire pieces! When Cyndie talked to me about music reviews for the magazine, I immediately responded that I am not a writer... especially following the amazing wordsmith Amy Jo Wrobel! However, a highlight in my music world is totally geeking out about print music. Yes, geeking. :) I absolutely love checking out the new music as it arrives. I'm always excited to suggest music to teachers and students to unearth that perfect piece. Honestly, so many of those suggestions come from talking to you; I discover I also love the pieces you use with your students! To begin this journey with you, I wanted to review two of my favorite oldies and two new arrivals that were presented by Dr. Suzanne Torkelson at the New Music Session during the 2023 State IMTA Conference at Coe.

Piano All the Way Book 4

William Gillock - Intermediate (1969)

Gillock...you seriously cannot go wrong with Gillock! This methodical series is a perfect example of lost and forgotten books that a teacher had pointed out to me years ago. Book 4 focuses on chords and voicings, which makes it a great




book for beginner church pianists, but fun pieces for everyone to play. Starting with the first piece "Chorale" which is a great introduction to four-part harmony with excellent chord progressions. Selections like "Old Plantation" and "At the Opera" champion chord inversions. One of my favorites is "In Old Vienna", where I can literally imagine myself sitting outside a restaurant with an accordion player strolling by. Then I transport to the circus to watch a clown perform tricks with "The Juggler". Finishing

this book off with a bang - the bold "Journey in the Night" with heavy chords, arpeggios and scales to create a flashy piece listed at both B and C levels. (P.S. – Book 3 is also amazing!)

Cream of the Crop Book 2

Various – Early Intermediate (1960 – 1980)

This book has always been one of my childhood favorites. I remember sitting at a recital when a girl in my grade went up to the piano and my jaw just dropped. She played this bold showstopping piece and oh my goodness- I wanted



to play it too! "From a Lighthouse Window" (Burnam) starts with big striking chords going down the piano with a light fluffy interlude... it's great for those "Great Smoky Mountain" students! Also paired with "The Elf and the Fairy" (Bentley) playful arpeggios, "Flamenco" (Scher) dance, the fun happy "Roller-Skating" (Wermel), and "Theme and Variations on a Spiritual" (Beard) – based on Joshua Fit the Battle of Jericho... all are sure to please a variety of students.

Standout Solos

Melody Bober – Intermediate (2022)

This is one of my new favorite books! Subtitled "10 Dramatic Pieces for Piano", this book is just that. Bober strikes again and creates a wonderful book of intermediate piano solos. The first piece, "Beneath the Stars" is beautiful and



reminiscent of a John Williams theme (in my opinion!). "Fiesta Friday" will make you dance

at the piano... try to keep your feet on the floor for this one! Or tip-toe around playing "A Sneaking Suspicion" with the left hand processing into a genius boogie beat. As much as I dislike winter, I will admit "Snowy Wonderland' was impossible to play without smiling and thinking of frolicking through light fluffy snow. Such a great variety of pieces and well thought out compositions that are entertaining to play.

Kangaroo Hop

Jeanne Costello – Early Intermediate (2022)

What a cute little energetic piece! I imagined two kangaroos playing and hopping around with happy little babies (or joeys) in their pouches. This is a stellar piece for left hand melody, while the right hand interjects with the "hopping". You will love the switch of staccato to legato in both hands and the use of different octaves in the piano. Such a fun catchy solo for students!

CELEBRATING A LIFE OF SERVICE

Pruce Lee Perry was born in Sac City, Iowa to Loraine and Hubert Perry. The family lived right behind the Methodist Church and as a child Bruce spent many hours with his grandparents and his father on their farm.

While in grade school, Bruce joined Cub Scouts, where one of his projects involved collecting postcards. While he discontinued scouting, Bruce's passion for collecting postcards became a lifelong hobby. While Bruce and his classmates were learning to spell words and read sentences, Bruce also began taking piano lessons.

Bruce's father Hubert used to tell him, "Find something that makes you happy, and be creative enough to get someone to pay you to do it. If you are fulfilled by what you do, you will never work a day in your life." Reminded of his father's mantra, Bruce decided it would be best to find something he loved for his occupation, and he was determined to accomplish that objective, regardless of others' expectations. Discovering the joy of music at a young age ultimately led to a vocation for Bruce.

After graduating from Sac City High School, he ventured off to Luther College in Decorah, Iowa to study music and biology. He later studied music at the graduate level at University of Iowa. As a classical pianist, he performed throughout the Midwest and in Brazil. As a singer he performed in recital, opera, and oratorio.

As a teacher, it was extremely gratifying to him to know that more than forty of his former students are currently pursuing careers in the musical world.

Bruce, a longtime member and adjudicator for the Iowa Music Teachers Association was also the Coordinator of Worship and Music at Grace Lutheran Church in Fort Dodge, Iowa for 32 years.

Directing the Fort Dodge Choral Society proved to be an opportunity that combined all of his creative talents— from choosing a theme for the next concert, to researching to find the right music, rehearsing with the choir, and finally performing. Bruce considered Choral Society's performance of "Alzheimer's Stories" by Robert S. Cohen and Herschel Garfein to be one of the most poignant artistic achievements of his life. While it was the love of music that brought these people into each other's lives, the choristers stayed together due to their deep friendships.

Bruce was a dedicated historian and visionary for Sac City and the communities of Sac County. Bruce published a book for Arcadia Publishing's Images of America series about Sac County,

using historic postcards from his collection that he started in grade school. He wrote many National Register nominations for historical properties in the area, including the Chautauqua Park Historic District, Park Hotel, and the Sac City Monument Square District.

Bruce was a successful grant writer, recently producing grants to help with projects like the kiosks near the popcorn ball, renovations to the Chautauqua Building, and the feasibility study for the middle school. Bruce was President of the Sac Community Foundation. He served on the Sac City Council since 2014 and was an ambassador for the community in numerous ways, leading his work to expand beyond the city and include roles like:

- Executive Board Member for Iowa League of Cities
- Past President for Northwest Iowa League of Cities
- President of Preservation Iowa
- President of Sac County Historic Preservation Commission
- Sac County Economic & Tourism Development Board Member

Bruce profoundly committed himself to the community of Sac City and was a Third Degree Mason in the Sac City Occidental Lodge #178, performing dozens of Masonic Services for his brethren who passed before him.


